




Sydney Mobile Vet Service

BEHAVIOUR - LEADERSHIP IS KEY

Not only must we take care of our pets' physical health but we need to be responsible for

their emotional health too. Emotional wellbeing is often overlooked possibly because it is a complicated area involving both the behaviour of the pet and the behaviour of the "parent", which are intrinsically linked. We also need to

understand the mental condition of the species eg. dogs are pack animals and need to learn respect and trust in their owner so they don't have to feel responsible for their human family. What we often believe are problem behaviours we now understand

is anxiety and is often due to "leadership issues". Consistency and boundaries are crucial for your pet to feel safe and we must be careful not to transfer our "baggage" onto our pets - if possible!

Behaviour is complex requiring in-depth review. I'm happy to discuss and manage anything

with you and to work along side behavioural trainers and specialists if you need more help.



ARTHRITIS - THE WINTER AFFLICTION

Colder weather has set in and many dogs and cats are demonstrating signs of arthritis. Arthritis is one of the more common afflictions in our pets. Just as for us, they can be badly affected showing various

signs: stiff gait, difficulty standing up, reluctance to jump or walk down stairs, behaviour changes and decreased interest in exercise and appetite. Lying around or sleeping in our older pets is sometimes misinterpreted as "aging". Traditionally arthritis in cats was not given any credence but partly this may have been due to the lack of medications that were available to manage arthritic cats.

Breeds that can develop arthritis include labradors, german shepherds, rottweilers and many large breeds but any breed can be afflicted.

There are many treatment options. Some of which are scientifically proven while others are more anecdotal. It all depends on your experience and



personal preferences. A good diet and normal weight is imperative. We usually try courses of non-steroidal anti-inflammatories which can be very useful and give a new lease on life. We have

> similar safe medications for cats now which often make a big difference. We also have a 4 week course of injections which improves joint function and decreases pain.

Anecdotally people say glucosamine and chondroiten supplements can help and now we're also trying omega

3&6 supplements which is believed to make a

difference. Finally acupuncture has certainly been shown to help improve mobility and decrease pain so this is worth consideration as well.

Newer procedures such as stem cell transplants from fat into joints are showing promising

results in some pets but very little data in our companion animals is available at the moment.

Take Home Message

Signs of arthritis can be confused with aging and considered "normal". Don't hesitate to discuss any concerns with us so we can assess if any treatment trials are appropriate.

HOME EUTHANASIA



One of the most important times in our pets' lives is the end of their life. We all try not to think about it but unfortunately euthanasia is a decision that almost every pet owner has to face. We don't let our pets suffer through intolerable pain and discomfort and we want them to live with dignity and respect. This is why we also want them to die with dignity and respect. You never quite believe the decision is right because it is so final. But for most of us the decision is made out of love and our pets know this.

I take euthanasia consultations very seriously. In fact it is probably the most important consultation that I do. My goal is to facilitate a dignified, peaceful and loving transition from life to death and whatever lies beyond. I am there to support the people left behind and give them encouragement that they are, despite what they may feel, acting in the best interests of their companion and out of love. As a mobile vet I can provide people the option of giving their beloved family member a comfortable, loving, pain free and most of all respectable end to their life and prevent further suffering.
